\*We use Michael's namesake for our youth in Grades 9-12. We pray for Michael's guidance and protection for these youth as they grow to become faithful young adults who will follow our Lord.

Hello from 3K,

October has flown by from fall leaves to our October theme of pumpkins and harvest! Which has been fun to explore!

This month we've added corn to our sensory table which is fun to pour into cups and dishes in the sensory table! It also gets all over the floor and the kids have been great helpers!

Speaking of helping, students in 3K are so helpful we've decided to give students weekly responsibilities with weekly jobs which range from line leader to caboose with sweeper, paper passer, supplies manager, electrician (lights on/off), circle time leader, door holder and more!

Students take pride in their job each week and remind their friends whose turn it is for each job!

FIRE SAFETY WEEK was a blast learning all about what to do if there is an emergency! Students practiced stop, drop and roll. And learned hot and not. We even practiced a fire drill!

Academically, we've dove deep into learning our shapes, the first letter of our names and numbers 1-5 in literacy and math. Activities in class that help to reinforce these concepts through play include playdoh pumpkin and candy corn shapes, writing in paint, and counting the gumballs on our Circle Time Chart among other things.

In addition, we welcome the 7th & 8th graders in as reading buddies on Fridays! And the students love having their BIG buddies come in to read to them:)

Finally, we are having a blast learning about all of God's creation! Including seeing uniqueness in everything in nature and ourselves















#### Hello from the 4K classroom!

We have been very busy learning and having fun this past month! The students have become great helpers and take pride in completing their weekly job!

In Religion, we just finished talking about Creation and how God made us all in his image. We are now talking about the Ten Commandments. We are trying to remember them through song and dance!

In our ABC bootcamp, we just finished the letter F. We will work on the letter G next week. The students have started bringing a show and tell item for each letter and have done an awesome job with their creativity in finding an item. We have also had lots of practice writing our names and working on letter recognition.

In math, we have been talking about shapes! The students have the shape song down. They also did an awesome job making their shape pizzas! We will be back to number recognition next month! Working on numbers 1-10.

We have focused on fall and pumpkins this past month. The students have made a few art projects with pumpkins and painted their own pumpkin! They all had such a fun time at Wilkes Pumpkin Patch as well!

















THIS PAST MONTH, THE KINDERGARTEN CLASS HAD THE OPPORTUNITY TO VISIT THE FIRE STATION AND GOT TO RIDE A FIRE TRUCK! ALONG WITH GETTING A RIDE, THE STUDENTS WERE ABLE TO SEE INSIDE OF AN AMBULANCE AND ANSWER QUESTIONS ABOUT THE EQUIPMENT THEY SAW IN ORDER TO HELP SOMEONE WHO IS INJURED, OR IN NEED OF HELP.

IN MATH CLASS, STUDENTS HAVE BEEN TALKING ABOUT MORE, FEWER, AND SAME. STUDENTS HAVE TO USE THEIR COUNTING SKILLS TO FIGURE OUT WHICH GROUP OF OBJECTS HAVE MORE, FEWER, OR THE SAME AMOUNT. STUDENTS ARE ALSO LEARNING THAT IN ORDER TO SOLVE PROBLEMS, THEY CAN'T ALWAYS TRY AND MEMORIZE/GUESS FACTS- THEY CAN USE WORDS OR PICTURES TO HELP!

IN READING, STUDENTS HAVE LEARNED THAT THE LETTER A CAN COME IN THE BEGINNING AND ALSO MIDDLE OF WORDS. THEY GOT TO MEET FOUR SUPERKID CHARACTERS: CASS, OSWALD, GOLLY, ALF AND SOON-DOC!

STUDENTS ARE USING WHAT THEY LEARN ABOUT EACH CHARACTER TO HELP THEM

IDENTIFYING AND PRODUCE DIFFERENT LETTER SOUNDS.

IN SCIENCE, STUDENTS ARE STILL USING THEIR ROLE

OF WEATHER SCIENTISTS TO SOLVE A PLAYGROUND DILEMMA: WHY IS BLACK CONCRETE HOTTER THAN WHITE
PAVEMENT? STUDENTS HAVE BEEN USING MODELS TO DETERMINE THAT WHEN A LAMP THAT IS ON, IT
REPRESENTS THE SUN, AND IT IS HOT. STUDENTS WILL BE SOON TRAVELING OUTSIDE TO MAKE PREDICTIONS ON
THE WEATHER AND DETERMINE WHAT THE TEMPERATURE IS.




Greetings from Grades One and Two~

As the weather outside cooled down, the learning inside heated up!! Why? We started the month of October learning about Fire Safety. Along with reading books and watching Sparky the Firehouse Dog video clips, we had a visit from some volunteers from the Edgar Fire Department. They talked to us about what to do if we had a fire in our home and asked us to check our smoke detectors and CO detectors to be sure they are working properly. We want to encourage ALL of you to do the same! In Science, we are continuing to investigate plants to find out why there are no new chalta trees in the Bengal Tiger Reserve.



First we looked at seeds to see what they need to become full grown plants that produce more seeds. You guess it-they need enough sunlight and water. We are now looking at why the seeds might not be getting enough sunlight and water to grow. This week we started looking at the leaves and roots of local plants to find out their role in getting athe plant what it needs. Check out the pictures of us making scientific drawings of roots and leaves:



In Social Studies we are wrapping up our study of leaders. We learned about Abraham Lincoln and Amelia Earhart. One of the main lessons we learned is that real leaders are not always successful, but they keep trying their best! In Religion, we learned about the rosary and made watercolor decade rosaries. We are also learning about the "obedient love" of Noah, Abraham, and David as the Second Grade continues its journey to First Reconciliation on December 14th. Month, St. Francis, with the blessing of our pets. Thank you Father Alan for the blessing! We were thrilled to meet so many of our animal friends. Then just a couple days after, the Elementary students found plenty to keep them busy at Wilke's Farm. Meeting 2 dogs like Drew's at Wilke's Farm was an extra pleasant surprise! We are so grateful to everyone who makes our field trips possible!

Religion 3/4 finished up their second unit by creating colorful shirts that might remind us about Israel's beloved son, Joseph, and by taking time to view animated stories of Joseph and the Israelites. Coming up for November, St. Martin de Porres will be our "Be a Saint" featured saint. The challenges with Saint Martin will be: learn the "Prayer for the Dead," spend time with animals, serve the sick, and pray that all people are treated fairly with justice and respect.

Math 3 is investigating concepts of area measurement and how it relates to multiplication and addition. We progressed from tiles, to arrays, to grids, to more abstract representations of partially gridded rectangles and rectangles simply labeled with their side lengths. With ELA 3, Jacob can tell you all about nouns and explain the steps on how to play dodgeball.

St. John Saints have been practicing in preparation for Veterans Day. Lyrics had been sent with the students in September. We hope you have been getting a nice preview of the songs. The Veterans will be able to enjoy hearing them soon. Keep working on enunciating those lyrics clearly. Be on the look out for Christmas songs soon as well. Time goes so fast!

Greetings from Mr. Tony's Classroom:

Can you believe it is already the end of the first quarter? I can't. It seems like we just started the school year. It was very nice meeting and seeing all my parents at parent-teacher conferences. All my classes have been working hard.

4th grade has finished unit one about sentences in grammar and started unit one in writing.

They will be working on writing a personal narrative. In reading class, they have just finished reading <u>The Trumpet of the Swan</u>. In science, they have been working on unit two in energy conversions. This is a new curriculum they really enjoy working on with hands-on experiments. Finally, in math, they started the unit on fractions.

They enjoy practicing what they learned during the lesson while playing the math game Prodigy. Prodigy allows me to put the objectives they learned in the lesson of the day in an assignment so they can practice math or English while having fun!


5th and 6th grade just finished the chapter on nouns for grammar. Both grades will be starting unit one in writing and will also be working towards writing a personal narrative. In reading, 5th grade is just finishing <u>Old Yeller</u> while 6th grade is wrapping up <u>Where the Red Fern Grows</u>.

6th grade had been working on a special project. They have written an essay for Veterans Day. The topic for the essay was "My Pledge to Our Veterans.-"

They will be submitting them to the VFW's Patriot Pen for the scholarship contest.

4th, 5th, and 6th will be watching movie versions of their books after we are finished with them. This will give them the opportunity to first read the book as the author intended it and compare how much is cut from a story when it is made into a movie. Each day we will compare and contrast the book version and the movie version. All the students have been increasing their comprehension and vocabulary by reading a story. After reading the story, the students take an AR comprehension and vocabulary tests on the books they have read. Here are some pictures of 4th grade During AR time.






October has been a busy month for the middle school students. In science, grades 5 and 6 have been learning about metabolism in the human body. They have used their knowledge to successfully diagnose a fictional patient that had specific symptoms related to metabolism. The 7th and 8th graders have been learning about forces, velocity, and motion. They have been investigating a failed space pod docking to learn more about those topics. Both classes have been using their knowledge to write scientific final reports.

On Friday afternoons, the 7th and 8th graders read to their little **Book Buddies** for 15 minutes. All the students really enjoy this!



On Thursday, October 13, 2022, the students did a fantastic job participating in the **Living Rosary**. They spoke with reverence and prayerfully recited their parts.



The middle school students were proud to meet Jo Ann Boyce at an assembly hosted by Edgar Public School. Jo Ann is one of the surviving members of the **'Clinton 12'**, the first group of African American students to desegregate public education in Clinton, TN, 1956. Her message of forgiveness and perseverance was inspiring to all.





Finally, on Wednesday, Oct. 26th, the middle schoolers journeyed to St. Paul, MN. Here you can see them at the **Cathedral of St. Paul**. The Cathedral is very awesome to see, inside and out. A couple fun facts: its capacity is 3000 and the height of the dome is taller than the Statue of Liberty! After eating lunch at the **Mall of America** food court, the final destination was **Snake Discovery** zoo and store. Here, students were given a tour of the reptiles and amphibians in the zoo. They could also pet some of the snakes, lizards, salamanders, and turtles!





## WHAT WE'RE LEARNING

## 7/8 Social Studies:

In 7th and 8th grade, we have finished learning about Mesopotamia and Egypt and are currently learning about Ancient Greece. This includes Grecian geography, technology, and culture.

## 5/6 Social Studies:

With the 5th and 6th grade, we have been researching new world explorers and we'll soon be learning about the creation of America.

## 3/4 Social Studies:

In 3rd and 4th grade social studies, we have been learning about early pioneers, citizenship, and the story of America's creation!

## 5/6 Religion:

In our religion class, we have been discussing an overview of the Ten Commandments and have just begun learning about the Second Commandment. We have also learned about vows, respect for Holy items, and the making of Saints.

#### 5 Math:

In math class, students have been working on fractions as quotients and fraction multiplication (Unit 2). Our next unit will build on that topic and focus on multiplying and dividing fractions. Unit 3 will be a longer unit so continuing to practice multiplication and division facts as well as IXL skills shared on Google Classroom are great ways to keep up with our learning!





5 Math

#### Art 1-8

We began our art classes this year, as always, by making a portfolio in which to store our two-dimensional work. On the side with our names, we drew inspiration from **illuminated manuscripts** to create an elaborate first letter and, in some cases, decorate around it using something that began with the same letter as a theme for the whole portfolio. Projects we will make to fill the portfolio start by centering around the **Elements of Design**. Later in the year we will continue with the **principles of composition**.

For the first project, we learned about the various types of **line** quality possible with graphite drawing pencils (B stands for the bolder, darker ones, H for the hard lighter ones) and shaded in a **value** scale next to the right number on the sheet matching the number on the pencil. Next, we formed an **outline** of a found object (a feather) and shaded it in trying to duplicate the **contour lines** by following the direction of the feather tines. After shading those greys and blacks, we added highlights with a white colored pencil which looked nice on the blue toned mid grey or yellow paper. Grades 1 and 2 were able to make a circle into a ball by adding stripes or other lines and adding a cast shadow.

Currently older grades (3-8) are learning that flat **shapes** like pieces of paper can be wadded up and **formed** into all sorts of three-dimensional animals by taping around the wadded pieces with masking tape, strengthening and joining in some cases with wire and maybe even adding appendages (arms and legs, fins, etc.) with empty paper towel and toilet paper rolls or other found objects. A final touch involves painting the surface. Mixing paint involves reviewing what we know about **color**. Grades 1 and 2 first learn about color by layering the three primary colors (red, yellow and blue) to make a color wheel. I am happy for parents being able to see our growing menagerie of animals and colorful wheels at parent teacher conferences!
