Hello from the 4K classroom!

Happy Spring! Hope everyone had a great spring break! It is nice to get back to our routine. The students have started to notice signs of springs. The sun is shining more, the snow is starting to melt, and their bears have come out of hibernation.

In our ABC bootcamp, we are learning about the letter X. The students found that it was easier to find words that end with an X than to find words that started with an X. As we are nearing the end of our alphabet we will begin to talk about rhyming words and word families!

In Math, we have been learning about positional words. The students had fun acting out these words. (on top, next to, etc.) This week we started measuring! The students have already had some practice measuring everyday items such as crayons, markers, and glue sticks. They are using cubes to measure how long each item is. They then compare the items they measured to decide which is longer.

In Religion, we have been talking about Easter and Palm Sunday. The students learned that the reason we get palm branches on Palm Sunday is because when Jesus entered Jerusalem he was welcomed with the people waving palm branches and lining the road with them.

This past month, we celebrated St. Patrick's Day! After reading the book *How to catch a Leprechaun*, the students made traps to try to catch a leprechaun at school...although they made awesome traps, they were unsuccessful in catching a leprechaun. Better luck next year!

Happy Spring! Even though the weather still has a few tricks left for us, we have enjoyed the warmer temperatures outside. Inside we are still working hard to learn all we can! In Science we finally solved the mystery of why new chalta trees are not growing in the Bengal Tiger Reserve. It turns out that there is a fence preventing the elephants from entering the reserve. That means they can't eat the chalta fruit and disperse the seeds in their droppings. Along the way, we learned a lot about seed dispersal and what a seed needs to grow into an adult plant that can produce more seeds. One activity we did was using a model to help us discover what kind of seeds are best dispersed by the wind. Next up, we will study the properties of different materials to develop a glue we can use at school. In Social Studies, we did a unit about Money and learned why it is important to save money so we can be consumers and use our money to buy goods and services. In Religion, we continue to learn about the Mass as Ruthie, Kash, and Sam prepare for First Holy Communion in May which is just one month away! We have also been journeying through Lent with Jesus, learning how our attitude can affect our experiences. We are also enjoying "The Trouble with Lent" which was given to us by the parish. It is a great story, and we are learning a lot about Lent by reading it. Best part we get to keep the book! We will wrap this up with some exciting news from Grade One: Klay, Max, and Cooper got to start taking AR tests this week. They are off to a great start.







Super Plant Scientists!

Today 3/4 students were happy to lead the Sorrowful Mysteries of the Rosary with scriptural meditations on Our Lord's Passion. Lucky Charm marshmallows made tasty St. Patrick Day pictographs that set up assorted math problems for us. Our Math units continue on with fractions and units of measurement. ELA 3 finished up adverbs/conjunctions and have just started punctuation/capitalization. At the start of March we joined the Read Across America Day live event with authors Peter H. Reynolds and Naaz Khan. Mid=March we started extra practice with Math and Language using Khan Academy. We have a goal of leveling up more than 30 rings by April 4. We are in our 25th ring. Keep on leveling up!


Science 3/4 - The third and fourth grades have just completed the Energy Conversions Unit. We will now be starting the unit on light and vision.


Social Studies 3/4 - They are currently working on a unit on the southeast. Just as they completed the exercise for the northeast

Language & Spelling 4 - The fourth-grade class is learning about pronouns. Students will be learning how to write descriptive writing after completing the unit on pronouns.












Fun at Recess

Since the beginning of March, the middle school students have been practicing diligently on their Forensics performances. Their hard work paid off at the **Forensics Tournament** hosted by St. Anthony's in Athens on Wednesday, March 29th. Many performances earned first or second place ribbons! Congratulations to all the students for their efforts! However, they are not quite off the hook yet. They will be performing their pieces at least one more time for a grade in ELA. Keep practicing, middle schoolers!

In 7/8 Science, the students are wrapping up their learning of the Earth, Moon, and Sun unit. How and when do lunar eclipses happen? Why doesn't this event happen more often? These are questions the 7th and 8th graders could answer.

The 5/6 Science class has been learning about ocean currents, the prevailing winds, and El Nino. Using models, simulations, and information from articles, they have been learning how the ocean affects the climates of New Zealand and Peru. It's a pretty amazing system!

In 8th grade math, the students are learning about plotting data in graphs. In 7th grade, solving equations and working with inequalities are the focus, and in 6th grade math, the students are using variables in equations. **Teacher: What is 2n + 2n? Student: I'm not sure. That sounds 4n to me.**:)

MARCH NEWS

Hello everyone! The school year is just flying by and we are continuing to have fun and learn lots as spring arrives!

In **7th and 8th grade social studies**, we have been learning about ancient China, including the Han and Qin Dynasties and Fr. Matteo Ricci.

In **5th and 6th grade social studies**, we have finished our chapters 10 and 11. In chapter 11, we specifically learned about the history of Catholics in the early United States. It was very challenging to be Catholic in a brand-new, mostly Protestant country. We will be moving on to our chapter 12 which begins to discuss Lewis and Clark, Westward Expansion, Manifest Destiny, and the War of 1812.

In **5th grade English Language Arts**, we finished our tall tales and are beginning to learn about different types of sentences and how to write persuasively.

In our **5th and 6th grade religion class**, we have been continuing to learn about Theology of the Body. In 6th grade, we are acknowledging that we are all made in the image and likeness of God by making origami, analyzing literature and art, reenacting skits, and learning about people who are different than we are.

Lastly, in **5th grade math**, students have finished their unit 6 and have started unit 7. In unit 7 we will be learning about geometry, including learning about the coordinate plane, the hierarchy of shapes, and numerical patterns. In our last unit of the year, unit 8, we will be reviewing and practicing everything we have learned this year so we are ready for 6th grade math next year!

Our middle school students competed in the NERR forensics competition at St. Anthony de Padua in Athens this past Wednesday, March 29th. They all did phenomenal! In total, St. John's brought home 23 first place ribbons, 5 second place ribbons, and 2 third place ribbons! Congratulations to all the middle school participants!

The Egg = Spring & the Circle of Life




Vegetables (Parsley) dipped in salt water = sweat and tears shed by the Israelites in Egypt.

The Seder Meal symbolized the Passover (when the Israelites were spared) and the Exodus from Egypt.




Lettuce = Bitterness
