Dear Parents,

Wisconsin Parental Choice Program Open Enrollment is February 1 - April 23, 2023!

The Department of Public Instruction (DPI) has posted a number of resources for Choice schools and parents for the upcoming 2023-24 student application process. We encourage everyone that falls within the eligibility range to apply; do not hesitate because we are actually reimbursed more from the choice program than the amount we charge for tuition, which non-Choice families pay. So that is the benefit for the school; another benefit to you, as a Choice family, is that you are not expected to pay out of pocket for sports or field trips.

Note: Only families who have children in 4K, 5K, 1st grade can apply if they are already at the school.

- Parents must electronically submit the Online Parent Application at https://dpi.wi.gov/choice, and all applicants, regardless of their Choice status in the prior school year, must apply for the program every year.
- Parents must provide the school(s) to which they apply proof of student eligibility including residency documentation and income documentation (if applicable). This documentation must be received by the school prior to the close of the application period in which the application is submitted via the Online Parent Application.

- Our school may assist parents during the application process, but the school may not submit applications on behalf of parents in the Online Parent Application. Our school may answer questions and have computers available for parents to use.
- Many parents complete the Online Parent Application in early February. As a result, the Online Parent Application and the Online Application System (OAS) may be slower in the beginning of February.
 - Reminder parents: (1) Choice applications received in the same open application period are NOT accepted on a first come, first serve basis and (2) applying in the Online Parent Application may be faster/easier if you apply after early February.
 - Our school will offer an open lab for parents to complete the Choice application, in school during parent/teacher conferences, which is February 23rd from 4-7 p.m.

Hello from 3K,

In December/January we've been diving into the Christmas Season and Winter activities!

December was truly filled with spirit! Students learned all about the Holy Family and got really good at retelling the Nativity Story. We also worked hard in music on our songs for the Christmas Concert, which was a blast! The kids were so proud of what they practiced and to share it with their parents and grandparents!

January has been filled with snow! And showing up in all different forms... students are loving sledding down the hill behind school in the snow during recess, they are learning how to spell their names with snowmen building, they are playing in the sensory area with shaving cream snow and reading all about the Sneezy Snowman!

It's been "snow" much fun:)

We have also continued to work on our shapes, colors, numbers, letters and name recognition! The students continue to improve their skills each and every day! They are making connections between numbers and one to one correspondence when they are counting. They are also learning that letter sounds go with letters!

Students continue to build community in our classroom through our social, emotional and religion lessons. The last two months we've been focused on sharing, taking turns, problem solving and making good choices! The students are spilling over their learning into other areas of their day as well, especially in Mass where they are eager to answer Father Alan's questions during the homily!

Students are still learning about helping themselves to dress and undress their winter gear for recess. Students continue to get better at learning how to independently get their snow pants, boots, jacket, hat and mittens on. Some have even started zipping their coats!

So many things for us to learn about so many ways to get better every day!



Hello from the 4K classroom!!

As Catholic Schools Week is next week we have been talking about how special it is that we get to learn about Jesus in school! We have learned how we can show our love for Jesus- by being kind to others, helping others, and also by listening and staying quiet while at Mass.

In Math, we have been working on our number recognition focusing on 1-20. We have practiced this through a couple different games. One being Go Fish!

In Literacy, we have learned so many letters! We are more than half way through the alphabet. We have been forming letters, in the sand, and with playdough! In January, we learned about letters M,N,O, and P. When singing the alphabet, the students have found that we really have to sing slowly to hear these letters as we sometimes sing that part of the song very quickly!

In Science, we are talking about the seasons and the different weather that comes with each season. The students have been working on their seasons book where they are drawing the weather or items (swimsuit, boots, etc.) they could expect to see in each season!

Lastly, we have been really enjoying winter! During recess the students have been sledding and playing in the snow!



























Hello From Kindergarten, 2023!

These past couple weeks in kindergarten, students have been making progress in their letters, letter sounds, and sounding out CVC words. We have now met all of the Superkids so we are able to easily identify the sounds and letters due to their names. We have also been learning a lot of sight words and have started bringing them home so we can practice even more! We are on our way to becoming great readers!

In math class we have started using ten frames to help us add and subtract numbers within 10. We are also learning that we can solve addition and subtraction problems within word problems but we must use our very best listening ears to comprehend the problem!

In science, we have solved our first playground problem! One playground gets hotter than the other because the surface is black, which attracts the sun more. We are now learning about a new playground problem- why does one playground flood, while the other one does not?

Lastly, in religion students have been learning what it means to be made in God's image. Father Alan came in and had the students look at their reflection in a mirror. He then explained that they could clearly see themselves. Then he had students spray the mirror with water and asked what happened to their image. The students both realized that their image was a lot harder to see and very blurry- therefore we are not acting in the image of God! We also discussed the difference between making wrong choices and mistakes, and that no matter what- Jesus will always forgive you!









Greetings from Grades One and Two~

It has been a long time since we checked in and we have been busy! In our last letter, we mentioned that Globe Trot Scott was bringing us packages to help us learn about holidays around the world. Scott sent packages including a fact sheet as well as a snack and/or activity for each country he visited. On the fact sheet, we drew the flag of the country and wrote down some of the interesting things we learned. Snacks/activities included Buche de Noel, a yummy log-shaped chocolate cake, for Joyeux Noel in France, Italian pastries and a napkin with a note to hide for Buon Natale in Italy, a piñata we got to make and fill with candy for Feliz Navidad in Mexico, a dreidel and gelt for Chanukah Sameach in Israel, a pretzel-shaped sweet treat called jalebi for Diwali Mubarak in India, and finally a gingerbread person to decorate for Froehliche Weihnachten in Germany. After we received our last package from Scott, we began to learn about life long ago. So far we compared schools, homes, and communication long ago to now. We decided life is much easier for us now, but we have a lot more to learn about! In Science, we are continuing our quest as plant scientists to find out why new chalta trees are not appearing in the Bengal Tiger Reserve. Our most recent investigations have centered around seed dispersal. We did some fun simulations involving fictitious flitterbirds and strongbills eating and dispersing (through their droppings) sweetpink and yummyberry seeds to see how the seeds get to places they are likely to grow into an adult plant. We also learned that dispersal through animal droppings is just one way seeds are dispersed. In Religion, the biggest thing is that after being cancelled by the weather in December, Ruthie, Kash, and Sam finally received their First Reconciliation! Please continue to pray fer them as they take the next step in sacramental prep and get ready for First Holy Communion in May. We also had fun designing and making jigsaw puzzles for our families for Christmas. Finally, we are looking forward to Catholic Schools Week. We hope many of you can join us for Mass on Saturday, January 28th, to kick off the week with a sledding social sponsored by our Home and School and Sunday, February 5th to wrap up the week with a breakfast sponsored by our St. John School staff and middle school students.





Greetings from Mr. Tony's Classroom



JANUARY NEWS

Hello families! So far we have had a great start to our new year! We are busy learning lots of new things and having SNOW much fun!

In **7th and 8th grade social studies**, we have finished learning about the history of the Christian Church, the Byzantine Empire, and have begun learning about the Renaissance and Reformation. Students completed a Christian Church research project and have created a project detailing the fall of the Byzantine Empire.

In **5th and 6th grade social studies**, we finished our chapter 7 project, which was recreating the Boston Tea Party on a small scale. Students worked in groups to make crates that would make a tea bag float and keep it dry when put into a basin full of water. We had a lot of fun creating and experimenting! We are now learning about the Revolutionary War and the key historical figures that fought for our freedom as a young nation.

In **5th grade English Language Arts**, we finished our formal business letters and sent them out to the businesses students wrote to. We are now working on learning about verbs and descriptive writing. We have been reading a lot of examples of descriptive writing and are excited to start our own!

In our **5th and 6th grade religion class**, we have been learning about the Theology of the Body. 5th grade has been learning about Greek Mythology and the beginning of Man: original sin, original nakedness, and where we are now. 6th grade will be learning about the Resurrection, focusing on how each student (and all of creation) is a gift of and from God.

Lastly, in **5th grade math**, students have been working hard and have finished their unit 4, which details multiplication and division of multi-digit numbers. We have learned various different algorithms to solve our problems and have moved on to our unit 5, where we are learn about place value patterns and decimal operations. Units 5 and 6 are longer and are super important to the rest of our learning in higher math, so we will be spending a lot of time on these two units.

Hello from English Language Arts and the Art classes!

English language classes are beginning a second novel The Red Badge of Courage but this time the questions and vocabulary lists are generated by the students. We will be learning more about literary analysis and proper documentation of sources also.

In the spirit of being doers of the word and not merely hearers, (James 1:22) Our current grammar focus is on verbs. Ask your student to give you a sample of transitive and intransitive verbs and how to tell the difference. Identifying and understanding troublesome verbs and linking verbs, as well as writing with an "active" rather than a "passive" voice should all help improve our skills while writing.







After working on the well-known Music K-8 cover contest, Art students celebrated the season of epiphany by learning two new techniques for making stars. For the first technique, students spatter watery paint for stars and print a moon with a bottle cover. In the second technique, student sprinkle salt on wet watercolor (which conveniently also looks like snowy sky for those who want to depict winter scenes). Come check these out in the hallways at school. Here is a sample:









Moving towards Valentine's Day, last year's most beloved project, bag sculptures are back. Students get a bag of items (each bag has the same items) which they must make into a sculpture. But, new this year, is the limiting criteria of a theme: "I love...". I look forward to reading the artist statements students share about how these sculptures depict something they love, became a gift for a loved one, or show a way to share God's love with others. Speaking of ways to show love, students have agreed to help make Valentine's Day decorations for the Valentine's Day dinner at Holy Family parish. Thanks for serving the needs of your parish!

In March (Youth Art Month), I will be submitting four student works (wish it could be more but that is the most I can submit and only for grades 5-8 so probably one work per grade level) to the 46th annual Student Art Exhibit at the Leigh Yawkey Woodson Art Museum. What a hard choice it will be to pick only four student works! At least I can display all student works in a mini galley in the church basement during catholic schools week. Maybe I will get some feedback on what to pick once I see all the work
