
3rd Grade

English

Our class started Module 2. The new module is about outer space. So far we have learned about a man named Galileo Galilei. The focus question is "How did Galileo learn about space?". As a class, we are learning about the ways that Galileo studied space.

Math

In class we started Unit 3; which has to do with "Wrapping up Addition and Subtraction" within 1,000. So far in class, we have focused on adding tens and hundred numbers together. We have been able to understand different algorithms and methods to solve the problems.





Religion

For religion, Ms. Hackel has been teaching about Adam and Eve and the discovery of the first sin which entered the world when the snake (the devil) had tricked Eve to eat the fruit off the tree of the knowledge of good and evil. God had been displeased with Adam and Eve with the sin that they did. After that they were punished for disobeying God. Following, we read about the first Adam and Eve's two children; Cain and Abel. They both gave an offering to God, although God was pleased with Abel's sacrifice because he gave his best unlike Cain who did not. Cain was jealous and hated Abel because of how God had been pleased with him and therefore killed him. From there, we started to learn about Noah's trust in God, when he was told to build the Ark he did what God had asked him to do.




4th Grade

English

We started Module 2 in our Great Minds book; which is about extreme settings. Our focus question that we have is "Why does the setting affect characters?". As a class we read a short story called "All Summer in a Day" which is set on the planet Venus and is about how students treat a character who remembers what the sun was like on Earth while other students don't believe her.

Math

In class we have been working on fractions and understanding unlike denominators of tenths and hundredths. Learning how to switch the denominator to equal the same number.

What We Learned

5th Grade ELA

The English language, with its rich, hybrid history and innumerable sounds and word choices, is ripe with opportunity for wordplay. It almost begs for it! But why play with words? is the question we dive into in our second module.

6th Grade ELA

What are the few ancient stories repeated in each new generation? Why has the mythological hero's journey been recycled over thousands of years and retold by every culture? What powerful lesson does that journey teach us about the value of struggle and the relationship between failure and transformation? These questions are the ones that we will study in module 2 this quarter.

7th Grade ELA

Through the draft and widespread voluntary enlistment, young men everywhere were swept into war. A shared patriotic purpose united Americans. But what were the impacts? Students dive into several accounts of how WWII impacted people and countries during this module 2 study.

8th Grade ELA

What were the effects of War World I? How can literature and art illuminate an understanding of the experience of individuals who were thrust into this conflict? Are just a few of the questions we study in module 2 this quarter.

Homework Corner

Students will be expected to continue to read a novel of their choice for AR for 20 minutes each night. In addition, they will have handwriting on M/W; typing practice T/H.



Grade Seven started a Proportional Relationships and Percentages Unit. Whether with fractions or decimals, the distributive property can be applied to rewrite expressions. In the near future, solving percent increase and decrease problems could involve commissions, interest, markups, or discounts.





Eighth Grade finished up Unit 3 on Linear Relationships. They practiced representing linear relationships with tables, equations, and graphs. Those graphs could have lines with positive or negative slopes, horizontal or vertical lines. Graphs can also be recognized as a set of solutions to linear equations.





We have the goal of writing both types of equations to represent the same situation or diagram. Coming up, we will have multiplication and division with multidigit numbers. Keep brushing up on those basic multiplication and division facts.









Grade Six is nearly done with their unit on rates and percentages. Tables, multipliers, double number lines, and tape diagrams are strategies that have helped with those lessons on unit conversions, rates, and percentages. Many of the application problems involve coupons and sales. Now with the Christmas shopping season upon us, the students could be ready to follow a budget and find the best deals.
