We cheered on the Edgar Wildcats by coloring our wildcat hats green and yellow and watching the parade!






QUOTE OF THE WEEK

In Religion, we learned about who Mary is and why she is so special. We celebrated her birthday eating cupcakes and searching the playground for a little Mary. We also used watercolors to color a picture of Mary. We then went on a nature walk and picked flowers to give Mary a flower crown. We have also been learning about Creation and what was created each day. The students enjoyed listening to a story about Creation and they were then able to recall what happened on each day. (Great listening skills!) We will start Catechesis of the Good Shepherd this week, the students are very excited about that! In Social Studies, we are learning about how to be a good person and how that may look in school, at home, and in church. We learned about how we can be respectful to ourselves, others, and the things in all of these places. For example, we talked about how in school we can walk quietly in the hallways so that we do not disturb other classes as we walk past. As we explored their summer adventures, we had a chance to share our own adventures. We also added the UFLI supplement to boost phonics skills. In Math, we are looking at surveys and creating ways to display the data we collect. We are also learning how to ask good questions about the data to help us practice addition and subtraction skills.

Welcome Back To School!

Happy Fall from the 3rd and 4th Grade classroom!! It's crazy how it's almost been a full month of school so far.

I have enjoyed getting to know the students in our classroom. They are very kind, caring, engaging, respectful, silly and Christ-like kids!

At Mass this year we have learned about being good, holy, thankful Saints. Father Alan focused on understanding types of fields God plants in us and their importance (faith, hope & love). By realizing that we are a part of God's fields we can spreading the word of God to others.





3/4 Social Studies

We have been learning about communities. What makes up a community of people? Then, we started learning about the three types of communities which are rural, urban and suburban.

During Social Studies we talked about heroes which went along with 9/11. Students learned about the men and woman who had saved others that day as well as those that protect our community that we live in now.



3rd Grade English

Module 1 is all about the Sea.

The students learn through essential questions for groups of lessons. Some questions we are working on include:

- How do artists explore the sea?
- Why and how do scientists explore the sea?

In the module we have seen pictures, videos and read books about the different non-fiction events that take place from the sea.

Math

We are learning about scaled bar graphs. Understanding that a bar graph goes up by 1 and a scaled bar graph goes up by more than one. We are currently working on multiplication by going up in equal groups.



4th Grade English

Module 1 is about A Great Heart.

Our Focus Questions are

- How does someone show a great heart, figuratively?
- What is a great heart figuratively?

We have been seeing pictures and using information from our Great Minds text to understand parts of the heart.

Math

We have been working on multiples of a number for multiplication. Such as 2 times a number each time going up. This is a important skill to understand when multiples then building our skills from that. Another skill that we have been working on is understanding what a factor and multiple are. When doing a multiplication problem there will be two factors as the number facts and one multiple that is the result of the two factors.





Grade Five started with a unit on volume. We used connecting cubes and compared the volumes of our creations. Then focusing on prisms, we practiced writing a variety of expressions that could be built by looking at layers. We even came up with an estimate for the volume of our classroom. Then we practiced reasoning by finding the volume of prisms combined together. With our next unit, we will be working with fractions.






Grade Six is nearing the end of the first unit on area and surface area. Understanding characteristics of polygons and identifying bases and heights was key as the relationship between the formulas for parallelograms and triangles was realized by recognizing how triangles can create parallelograms. Building on those concepts, we are moving on to polygons and the nets of polyhedra. As much as some may like it to be, that does not have anything to do with fishing.



Grade Seven has been exploring scale drawings in Unit 1. As scaling figures moved on to scaling area, we applied what we were learning to maps and a representation of the Apollo Lunar Module from the 1969 trip to the moon along with comparing our heights to Neil Armstrong.



Eighth Grade has been mastering rigid transformations and congruence. After practicing translations, reflections, and rotations, we expanded our math vocabulary as we investigated whether polygons were congruent. As discoveries were made about angles created when two parallel lines are cut by a transversal, we moved on to proving that the sum of the angles in any triangle is 180 degrees.

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All the music groups have been singing beautifully! Middle School students have been leading Masses and have had an introduction to the treble clef and measures to read boomwhacker songs with better understanding. Elementary students have been enjoying some fall themed songs, practicing types of voices, and working on the beat of songs. If you ask any elementary student about their favorite song, there may be quite a few monkey fans, but there is very good chance the "raking leaves" song, "Autumn, Vivaldi," will be the one they'll pick.

What We Learned

We are very excited and working hard to understand new concepts in our new middle school ELA Curriculum Wit & Wisdom. In this curriculum, students are exposed to many different English concepts through the study of the arts, sciences, and history. Below are the line ups for Module 1 in each grade...

5th Grade ELA

Students go in-depth into Cultures in Conflict looking at the Nez Perce American Indians and how they find a way to belong in American Culture.

6th Grade ELA

Students go in depth learning about Resilience in the Great Depression as they read the novel *Bud, Not Buddy.*

7th Grade ELA

Identity is hard, especially in the Middle Ages. Students explore what it's like to live in medieval times by reading the Canterbury Tales and other stories.

8th Grade ELA

The poetics and power of storytelling are explored by students through novels in verse and art. This interesting mix of literature and art takes our discussions in a new direction!

Homework Corner

Students will be expected to continue to read a novel of their choice for AR for 20 minutes each night. In addition, they will have handwriting on M/W; typing practice T/H and grammar on Fridays.
